Andrea Lovell- Information night

Andrea Lovell, who is a teacher in Parkes, NSW, was a recent member of our November seminar in Collaroy. She has arranged an information night about Move to Learn for her school & community in Parkes. She asked us to give her some guidelines for such an evening & we thought we'd share them here to encourage others who might like to hold a similar event.

Looking at LD wholistically with other professionals

To introduce this topic you could show the half of the DVD that talks about the services of other professionals. - or at least parts of that half, depending on your time limitations. You could then ask for questions & elaborate on it. If you have any of those professionals in the community & you have already talked to them & know they are on the ball, you could ask them to your meeting as guests. Just introduce them but tell people they can talk to them after the meeting over a cup of tea. There won't be time for them to talk during the meeting.

What are your child's main problems?

Participants should be referred to Help Your Child to Learn for these kinds of questions. They should buy their own copy or get a copy from the library if they can't afford it. Don't lend yours, as you won't get it back, & it is better for them to own a copy for referral purposes.



There are, however, 3 basic areas that you can make them aware of.

- Does the child have food intolerances, chemical poisoning or a poor diet? This has to be attended to & you can guide them.
- If they seem to be poor listeners the ears should be tested.
- Do they have problems looking? All eyes should really be tested by a Behavioural Optometrist, unless already done.

Doing the Movement sequence with your class or child

Encourage them all to buy their own DVD & learn how to do the sequences with their children or students as outlined on DVD.

Practice the Movements at the meeting with a Buddy

Ask the participants to come to the meeting wearing pants so they can get down on the floor & roll with a buddy. Enough time should be spent rolling to enable the



participants to really know that they are doing it correctly. It is the basis for all the other movement sequences. Time permitting, you can also teach the flip flops & 1 or 2 others.

Emphasise that each movement needs to be learned correctly before going to the next one.

Check to see how automatically the participants are doing each sequence by getting them to do something else at the same time, for example: counting (forwards or backwards or odd or even numbers), saying the alphabet, holding a conversation, being blindfolded or saying a nursery rhyme.

Emphasise that they need to learn the rest of the movements thoroughly themselves from the DVD before they try to teach them to others.




A book to think about reading. A friend of mine in England has recommended this book to me
